FACTS ON DOGS AND HEAT Many pets die each year as a result of being left in parked cars during warm weather. Temperatures inside a parked car, even with the windows open and in the shade, can rapidly reach very dangerous levels, even on a relatively mild summer day. A dog's normal body temperature is about 39° C (102° F).
